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During the last six decades there has been tremendous increase in the number of poor orphans, widows, patients, disabled and needy among the Muslims of India who constitute 13.4 percent of the population of our beloved country (as per Census 2001). Such a pathetic condition is definitely a cause for serious national concern. Innumerable widows and poor women and men live under deplorable circumstances of want and squalor. Tens of thousands of children are not able to enjoy their innocence and have, instead, to work in tea shops and similar other places. Young girls in large numbers stare into the eyes of their poor parents anxiously awaiting matrimony. Sometimes people have no option but to beg on the street. Many do not have access to education despite having intellectual capacity to do so. Lack of participation in governance frustrates the educated youth.

Children are God's gifts to us. They are the center of the parents' attention. They become the medium of God's kindness to the humanity. They will Insha Allah constitute our future generations. It is crucial to ensure good education for them so that they may imbibe high moral values and a balanced personality. They are supposed to be a source of domestic and social pleasure and a channel for our ultimate salvation in the life hereafter. Every toddler has a right to be brought up in a good atmosphere so that he or she could never be exploited. The community has moral obligation to take substantial steps for ensuring proper upbringing and educational development of the orphans and other poor children.

There is Godly injunction for helping the orphans, widows, poor and the downtrodden children. In fact, faith binds us to give precedence to the requirement of the hungry, the orphan, the needy and the neighbour over ourselves.

Thus some seriously concerned citizens of India got together and established Zakat Foundation of India in 1998. This organization takes pleasure that it has been able to bring happiness and prosperity in a large number of poor families and has been helping the orphans, the old persons, the students, the girls for marriage etc. Praise be to God, the Cherisher and Sustainer of the worlds, Most Gracious, Most Merciful.

ZFI is a vibrant organisation, expanding and developing continuously year after year. 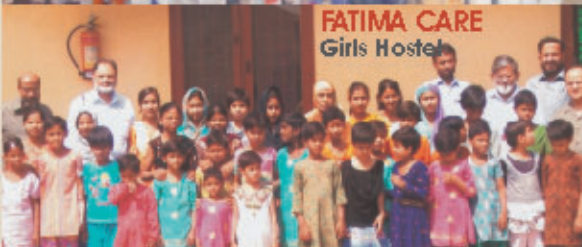


Happy Home & Fatima Care

The soft hearted persons would still recall the dreadful last week of February 2002 when some anti-national and anti-social elements had put a train compartment on fire and consequently a much larger number of bad elements had unleashed a reign of terror, tyranny and killings, consigning to fire human lives and properties in different places of the Indian state of Gujarat. A couple of thousands died and tens of thousands were rendered homeless. Large number of children had their education discontinued. A team of Zakat Foundation of India camped in Gujarat and provided medical and financial relief. Seriously injured persons were brought to Delhi for treatment. Poor orphaned children were brought to the newly established Happy Home India, New Delhi under the umbrella of Zakat Foundation of India. In later years, the ZFI purchased the Happy Home building and now owns this property. Recently the girls have shifted to nearby Fatima Care, also run by ZFI.



At Happy Home India and Fatima Care arrangements are going on for food, shelter, clothing, education, medical assistance and entertainment etc for these children. They study in the best school of the area known as God's Grace. The school does not charge Zakat Foundation of India in respect of fees, books and uniform for the children. Happy Home/Fatima Care have their own bus. Additional tutors visit there for helping the children in homework and another set of tutors impart spiritual and moral education. Besides, there is a staff of nine persons. Orphans and very poor children have now started joining from other states also. Large number of applications are still pending but the Foundation does not have resources to admit additional children.



Zakat Foundation has bought a plot of land measuring 1100 sq. yard near Kalindi Kunj, Delhi for constructing a new building which can accommodate 300 additional boys and girls and a proper living place for aged persons. The construction has yet to begin. Map is ready and we want to start the construction immediately, but due to shortage of funds are unable to do so. We solicit your help for this noble cause.

Medical Services

Mercy Home India

The Sachar Committee Report indicates that the only place where Muslims are present in substantial number in India are the hospitals. ZFI had already gauged this grim situation. Several years ago the Foundation established in Delhi a charitable medical centre known as Mercy Home India that is now running in Bawana area of Delhi where half a million poor people live without proper medical support. At Mercy Home, apart from clinical examination, facilities for ECG, X-ray etc are available. Hundreds of poor patients are attended to every day and medicines are dispensed.

At Bawana there was no regular mosque. Hence, Masjid Fatima has been established there (through non Zakat funds).

Adams Hospital

Arrangements for all kinds of treatment and surgery are also available at ZFI's Adams Hospital located in Okhla Vihar, Jamia Nagar, New Delhi. It is registered with Govt. of N.C.T. Delhi & also has certificate of ISO 9001-2000. It is a twenty bed Hospital with ICU facilities, having Dental & Eye Department also.

Seriously Injured persons of Gujarat riots and Kashmir earth quake were brought to Adams for successful treatment. Whenever required, the Foundation organizes specialized medical aid at All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) and other hospitals.

Mobile Dispensary

ZFI runs its medical van through the poverty stricken outlying areas of Delhi as per set time table. It carries a doctor, paramedical staff and medicines.

Distress Calls

The Foundation established medical camps during Gujarat riots, Kashmir earthquake, Tsunami affected places and hunger-stricken Murshidabad (West Bengal).



Dialysis & Kidney Transplant

By God's grace, we have also been able to successfully help patients for dialysis and kidney transplant. For instance, a young girl of Old Delhi was diagnosed with total kidney failure immediately after her marriage. Her husband abandoned her. Her mother was ready to donate a kidney. Bi-weekly dialysis was organized for her for several months followed by successful kidney transplant. The post-surgery monthly bill runs into Rs. 8,000/-. Another similar case was brought to the Foundation from Assam. He is a 50 year old patient. His son was ready to donate kidney. The patient was admitted to St. Stephen Hospital, Delhi and transplantation was successful. Medicines are being given every month. A third case of 37 years male is under dialysis at Holy Family Hospital under ZFF's sponsorship. There is a long list of other similar applicants.



Help for Marriage of Poor Girls

Poor and needy girls are helped by the Foundation for their marriage. So far an amount of Rs. 1.5 million has been spent by the Foundation for helping in the marriage of hundreds of such girls. Yet a large number of girls are still waiting for help.

The Foundation requests you to participate in this social development plan.

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The donors of Zakat, Sadaqaat, Fitra, Imdaad and other charities to Zakat Foundation of India are entitled to deduction under section 80G of the Income Tax Act. Also the Foundation is registered under the Foreign Contribution Regulation Act (FCRA).

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Help to widows and other indigent persons

For several years Zakat Foundation of India has been distributing monthly requirement of raw food items and oil / soap / detergent etc. among indigent widows and other indigent persons. Yet a long list of such applicants is still pending with the Foundation. The Foundation appeals to you for your generous donation.



Relief work in Gujarat riots, Tsunami, Kashmir earthquake and Murshidabad

During Gujarat disturbance, ZFI team camped there and provided medical assistance, clothes, hand carts, ice cream trolleys, sewing machines etc. Seriously injured persons were treated in Delhi. Financial help was rendered for the marriage of girls living in camps and for construction of houses for the homeless.

The Tsunami waves which struck the coast of South India in December 2004 had devastating impact on fishing villages & towns all along the coastline with human death toll of over 8000. Lakhs of people were rendered homeless. It damaged the entire coastal economy of Tamil Nadu. In order to bring the lives of the affected people to normalcy Zakat Foundation of India sent a group of volunteers to the worst affected parts of Tamil Nadu and medical help was provided to 2500 patients in 12 camps. Families were rehabilitated under ZFI's self-employment scheme.

Based on the report of a Japanese NGO that people of Murshidabad (West Bengal) were dying of hunger, a ZFI team visited there, met the affected people, provided medical relief, distributed cereals etc and cash among the needy and appealed to the haves on radio and T.V. to give financial and material support to the downtrodden.

Zakat Foundation's team camped in Kashmir after the 2005 earthquake and provided medical and financial relief. Seriously injured patients were brought to Delhi and were got treated for months at All India Institute of Medical Sciences.

Bohar Flood victims (2009) were also helped by ZFI.



Education & Employment

Iqra Mission

The Prophet (peace be upon him) said that it is obligatory for every believing man and woman to get educated. The process of revelation of the Holy Quran began with the word 'Read'. This strengthens the premise that the welfare of the community depends upon the education of its children. We should ensure that our children are admitted in educational institutions. For this purpose the countrywide network of Madaras is playing a good role. Yet only 3.5 percent of the community children take advantage of the Madarsa education. Hence Zakat Foundation has begun a process of making arrangements for the education of the poor and needy children. After proper investigation the fee is paid directly to the institution. Besides, the Foundation has entered into agreement with recognized/residential schools. Hundreds of children from all over India have been admitted in different educational institutions under the sponsorship of Zakat Foundation. Yet many more hundreds of applications are still pending with the Foundation but we are unable to admit additional children for want of financial resources.



Empowerment through Participation in Government

Sir Syed Coaching & Guidance Centre

As per Census 2001, Muslims constitute 13.4% of the Indian population. Yet their presence in higher Government services is hardly 3%. In 2007, Zakat Foundation of India established Sir Syed Coaching & Guidance Centre in Delhi and took upon itself the responsibility of financing the best possible coaching to the academically bright but financially needy candidates for civil services competitive examinations. They are known as ZFI Fellows. From whole of India about 3,50,000 candidates appear for Prelims. Out of them, about 10,000 are able to qualify for the Civil Services Mains Examination which is generally held by UPSC in Oct-Nov every year. Thus, the success rate at Prelims is about 3.5 percent. However, for the ZFI Fellows the success rate remain above 50%. This is because of special grace of God. Several ZFI fellows have finally succeeded and they have already joined the Government in senior positions. This includes ZFI fellow Shah Faisal, who topped in IAS in 2010, with God's Grace. At worldly level this can be explained to be because ZFI Fellows are sponsored in the best civil services coaching institutes of India, mostly based in Delhi. We also take care of the ZFI Fellows' boarding in Delhi and, in poorest cases, some other daily needs too. For this purpose a building has been hired in Delhi's Mukherjee Nagar, where most of the best civil service coaching institutes are located.

Competitive Cycle

One competitive cycle begins from May of one year when ZFI organises its all-India entrance test and interviews. Based on these, ZFI Fellows for that year are selected out of those who are most brilliant but also most needy. These Fellows begin their coaching in top level coaching institutes in Delhi from June. There are several modules of this coaching for General Studies and two optional subjects. These ZFI Fellows appear for Civil Services Preliminary Examination in May next year (i.e. after one year of coaching). Those who qualify in the Prelims appear for the Mains in Oct-Nov. And, those who qualify in the Mains are interviewed by UPSC a few months after the Mains. In this way, for one process of recruitment, the competitive cycle of ZFI Fellows is of two years. But simultaneously, three competitive cycles are conducted by ZFI for civil services recruitment for three consecutive years.

Each candidate who finally succeeds for Civil Services Examination and joins an All-India or Central Service like IAS, IFS, IPS, IRS, IRTS is enabled not only to take good care of his / her family but also of thousands of others throughout his or her service career of 32-36 years. He/she influences the government decisions on daily basis in different departments as district collector, superintendent of police, ambassador, commissioner of income tax and customs, Principal Secretary to the Government etc.

Alas, this is where Muslims have been lagging since Independence in 1947. They are not visible in government offices. This is what Sachar Committee has recorded with documentary evidence. The community can improve this situation by encouraging and supporting its bright graduates and post-graduates to appear for the Civil Services Examination in large numbers and with well directed and best available coaching/support. Similarly, for other government positions also help is provided by the Foundation.

ZFI appeals to you to generously contribute for this noble cause of nation building so that larger number of bright but needy boys and girls are able to get good government positions and become useful citizens.



HAJ FUND of INDIA

At no point of time have all Muslims of the world ever been Hajjis. It would always be that a selected few would perform Haj. That is as per Allah's law. May you constructively aspire to be part of the 'selected few'.

Haj expenses are going up year after year. On the average, It takes a Muslim around seven to eight years to save up for Haj. During this period, we the Indian Muslims often save money in unsystematic and traditional manner. Many of us believe that money kept under the bed, pillow, in the pot or even in bank locker is not only safe but also such methods of saving are free of Riba.

Most of us do not like to keep these savings in the conventional banking system to ensure that our pious savings are not utilized for interest based commercial activity prohibited in Shar'ah. Yet, in modern times, at any place other than a bank the safety of savings is not fully guaranteed. This is a paradox.

HAJ SAVINGS DEDICATED FOR SOCIAL UPLIFT

If we add up individual amounts saved for Haj, we find that a huge corpus of money remains stagnant and does not generate any economic activity. This is against Islamic spirit. Also, there is practice of selling off land and property to raise funds for Haj. This again does not contribute to economic growth of the individuals nor of the Millat.

Haj Fund of India has come up with an appropriate solution to this problem in a manner that enhances your sawaab while you save for Haj.

It operates as a service agency to facilitate safe keeping of your savings for a pious purpose. The service has passed legal vetting.

MAKING DEPOSITS WITH HAJ FUND OF INDIA

Any Indian Muslim can open his or her Haj Account with HFI. Deposits can be made any time in this Haj Account in multiples of thousands. Like, 1,000, 2,000, 3,000, 4,000, 5,000, etc. ... or more. There is no upper limit. You can deposit as many instalments as you wish and you can do so whenever it is convenient to you.

In favour of "HAJ FUND OF INDIA ACCOUNT NO. 603020110000239, BANK OF INDIA" you have to either obtain a bank draft of your money or write an "A/C Payee" cheque and deposit it in any branch of Bank of India anywhere in the country.

You must write your full name, address and phone number, if any, behind the draft/cheque. Please make two photocopies of the draft/cheque. After doing so, please fill the Account Opening Form (HFI-A - Enclosed with this brochure, it can also be downloaded from www.zakatindia.org) and send it along with a photocopy of your draft or cheque through Speed Post or Registered Post to the following address: CEO, Haj Fund of India, Zakat House, 2nd Floor, Okhla Vihar, Jamia Nagar, New Delhi 110 025.

WITHDRAWAL FROM HAJ FUND OF INDIA:

As regards withdrawal from your account, when you are going to perform Haj, it is very simple.

You have to send to us by post or give us by hand an application in Form (HFI-A - It is available on www.zakatindia.org) We will issue a cheque or pay order in your name or in the name of Haj Committee or your travel agent. It's your choice. It would be sent to you by speed post or registered post or you can collect it in person.

UTILIZING HAJ FUND OF INDIA FOR COMMUNITY BENEFIT:

HFI has a Shar'ah Advisory Council (see complete list online) that advises and supervises it on financial matters. It targets multi-faceted investment projects in conformity with Shar'ah guidelines.





Some part of the Haj Fund of India is utilized to disburse short term microfinance loan to poor Muslims. For example, a Rickshaw puller buys a Rickshaw (instead of paying daily Rickshaw rent to its owner). Out of his savings he pays back the loan (without interest) to Haj Fund of India, over a period of six months.

So, within six months the loan amount comes back after economically empowering the Rickshaw puller.

Also, on the deposits, HFI makes the Zakat payment, on behalf of the depositors to its parent organisation, namely, Zakat Foundation of India.

The account holders get the added satisfaction that HFI provides significant social services through Zakat collected from the depositors' accounts. This amount is utilised for helping the needy as per the specified Quranic categories, through Zakat Foundation of India.

That way, the sanctity of your Haj savings goes up and you will inshaAllah get greater sawaab of performing Haj. In any case, the much larger purpose of Haj - "the community is more important than the individual" - is adequately served reserving for you a higher pedestal in the life hereafter.

HFI also encourages the Indian Muslims to start saving at younger age to be able to go on the pilgrimage when they turn adult. All parts of Indian Muslim society stand proud when they hold an account with HFI as an intending pilgrim ('Azam-e-Haj).

Throughout history, the 'Haj Economy' has been a source of prosperity. In today's global economy, the skills associated with Haj, if strategically leveraged, could also become a source of community uplift.

HFI is one of the many examples how Islamic teachings can be implemented in today's modern world and, once implemented, how useful and beneficial these can be to the individuals as well as for the ummah.

Employment Opportunities

Zakat Foundation of India helps the poor families and individuals to become financially independent. Sewing, peko, interlock machines are distributed among the widows and unemployed girls. Men are given carts for selling fruits and vegetables. Tools are provided to cycle rickshaw and auto rickshaw mechanics so that they can run their profession. Cycles are given to the millmen. Women, who can sell from house to house, are provided with saleable household goods. After Gujarat riots and Tsunami tragedy etc people were given ice cream trolleys, cycle rickshaws etc. Members of the Foundation regularly study the Employment News. Large number of vacancies are advertised there are brought to the notice of the needy through translation in Urdu and vernacular languages and advertisements are got published by the Foundation in local dailies. Help is rendered in purchase / filling of admission forms and coaching is given for preparing for the entrance test.

Support of Ulema, Muftis and Religious Scholars

The members of the Foundation have regular meetings with Ulema, Muftis and other Religious Scholars many of whom have also delivered valuable speeches in the public gatherings of the Foundation. They are uniformly of the view that, like Namaz, we the Indian Muslims should also systematically organize, as per Shariat, the collection and utilization of Zakat and other charities. ZFI's Aims & Objectives

- (i) To organize collection of Zakat, Sadaqaat, Fitra, Imdaad and other charities and utilize these for the welfare of the poor and needy.
- (ii) To consult spiritual leaders and religious scholars in respect of the fulfillment of these aims and objectives.
- (iii) To help the poor and needy stand on their feet become financially independent and socially empowered.
- (iv) To establish and run educational institutions, coaching centres, orphanages, hospitals, dispensaries, old age homes etc for helping the poor and needy.
- (v) To establish a network of medical ambulances in order to help the poor and needy patients.
- (vi) To do any other work of general welfare.

Other Important Features

ZFI has separate bank accounts for Zakat, Sadaqaat, Fitra, Imdaad and other charities. Investigation is made and help is rendered to the poor and needy. ZFI's accounts are maintained meticulously and audited annually by Chartered Accountant. Returns are regularly filed with the Income Tax Department where the assessment is made as per law. The Foundation has its own Permanent Account Number (PAN), 80G Certificate and FCRA registration. It is also registered with the Planning Commission of India.
